Binoculars All Ages

Like most predators, lions have binocular vision with both eyes facing forward in the front of their face. This gives them depth perception which is important for knowing how far you need to run to get your food! Our lion sisters Mattie, Nimue, and Uzima like to sit way up high in their habitat and scan their surroundings, watching the pathways and keeping an eye on the other Zoo animals living nearby. Can you act like our lions? Make a pair of binoculars and scan around your house; maybe you'll see something you haven't noticed before!

Materials Needed:

- 2 toilet paper tubes (or one paper towel tube cut in half)
- Ribbon or string
- Stapler, tape, or glue
- Decorations!

Steps

- 1. Stand your tubes up next to each other with the sides touching. Connect them at the top and bottom where they touch with either staples, tape, or glue.
- 2. Add a neck strap by attaching a piece of string or ribbon to the outside edge of each tube. Decorate to your heart's desire!! Stickers, paint, leaves, glitter... bedazzle away!
- 3. Now your binoculars should be fully functional. If you pick them up, you should be able to see through the tubes off into the distance.



Pride Art

Lion families are called prides. Our pride at the Houston Zoo is made up of our male, Hasani, and three females: Mattie (short for Matulungu), Nimue (pronounced nee-moo), and Uzima (pronounced oo-zi-mah). Each lion has their own personality and individual markings to tell them apart! Lions are pretty rough and tumble, so most of these markings come in the form of scars. Check out the pictures and captions below to learn how to tell our lions apart, then re-create our pride using paint, some crayons, and a toilet paper tube!



Hasani, the only male lion, is easy to tell apart by his iconic mane. Only male lions have manes.



Mattie has the most scars with one under each eye and three on her forehead.



Nimue has only one scar under her left eye and two on her forehead.



Uzima does not have any scaring on her face. She is considered the "sassiest but prettiest".

Materials Needed:

- One toilet paper tube
- Scissors
- Yellow or orange paint
- Plate for paint
- Paper for painting
- Crayons, markers, or pencil colors

Steps

- 1. Cut a number of vertical strips into one end of your toilet paper tube. They should go about one-third of the way up and allow the end to flare out like a flower (or lion mane).
- 2. Dip the flared side into yellow paint (or orange, or blue, or pink, or green) and press it onto your paper. This should create a lovely mane-like shape.
- 3. Dip the uncut end of your tube into paint and press a circle in the middle of the flare to make the face outline. Then do three more circles for the ladies. Remember; no flare because they have no mane!
- 4. Now add eyes, nose, mouth, and markings to make each individual lion.
